Chapter 1: Understanding Social Science

These notes are designed as **original revision notes based on the official textbook**, rather than a reproduction of the textbook. Chapter 1 introduces Social Science as the systematic study of human society and explains how Geography, History, Political Science and Economics together help us understand society.

1. What is Social Science?

Social Science is the systematic study of human society.

It helps us understand:

- how people live together
- how societies change
- how governments function
- how economies operate
- how the environment influences human life
- how institutions and cultures shape society
- how the past and present are connected

Unlike Physics, Chemistry and Biology, which primarily study the natural world, Social Science focuses on **society, institutions, cultures and human interactions**.

Why is Social Science important?

Human life is connected to many systems. Food, transport, schools, electricity, markets, government services and the environment all involve cooperation between people and institutions. Therefore, Social Science helps us understand the connections between **people, places and systems**.

2. Social Science in Everyday Life

Social Science is not limited to the classroom.

Consider everyday activities:

- Food may be produced in one region and consumed in another.
- Roads are planned and maintained by public authorities.
- Schools operate within educational policies and programmes.
- Electricity may be generated far away and supplied through large networks.
- Goods reach consumers through production, transportation and markets.

These examples show that everyday life depends on **governance, economic production, social cooperation and the natural environment**.

Questions Social Science helps us ask

Social Science encourages us to ask questions such as:

- Why do some people live in crowded cities while others live in villages?
- Why do communities have different languages and traditions?
- Why are some regions dependent on farming while others focus on industry or trade?
- How do governments make decisions affecting large populations?
- Why are some regions more vulnerable to floods?
- Why does agriculture flourish in some regions?
- How does climate change affect human life?

Society is influenced by **history, geography, institutions, resources and human choices**.

3. Understanding Society Through Time and Traditions

Society has changed considerably over thousands of years.

Early human communities depended directly on nature for survival. Gradually, people:

- learned to grow crops
- domesticated animals
- developed tools
- established settlements

- exchanged goods
- organised systems of governance

Villages developed into towns, and towns eventually grew into cities. New ideas, inventions and cultural exchanges continued to transform human life.

Continuity and Change

Social Science studies both:

Continuity — what remains or continues over time.

Change — what transforms over time.

Understanding the past helps explain how present societies developed and how present actions can influence the future. Social scientists use evidence from different sources to study these processes.

4. Indian Knowledge Traditions and Social Understanding

The textbook highlights India's long traditions of **questioning, observation, reflection, discussion and logical reasoning**.

Pañchamahābhūtas

The concept of **Pañchamahābhūtas** describes the natural world through five fundamental elements:

1. **Prithvī** — Earth
2. **Āpaḥ** — Water
3. **Agni** — Fire
4. **Vāyu** — Air
5. **Ākāśha** — Space

The textbook presents this idea as an early attempt to understand nature as an interconnected system and discusses its relationship with the environment and living beings.

Vasudhaiva Kuṭumbakam

Vasudhaiva kuṭumbakam means “the world is one family.”

The idea expresses the interconnectedness of human societies across regions and cultures.

Arthaśhāstra

The **Arthaśhāstra**, attributed to Kauṭilya, is discussed as an important early work dealing with:

- administration
- economic management
- taxation
- governance
- responsibilities of rulers
- public welfare

It demonstrates that systematic thinking about governance and the economy existed in India long before modern academic disciplines developed.

5. Social Science as a Study of Disciplines

Social Science is **not one single discipline**.

Human society is complex, so different disciplines study different aspects of human life. The textbook uses the example of a drought: it can affect the environment, farmers' incomes, government relief, migration and traditional responses. Understanding such an event requires multiple perspectives.

At the secondary stage, the four core disciplines are:

Geography

Studies the Earth, environments and relationships between people and their surroundings.

History

Studies the human past and helps us understand how societies change over time.

Political Science

Studies governance, power, institutions, rights and responsibilities.

Economics

Studies how societies produce, distribute and use resources to meet their needs.

Other fields belonging to the broader Social Science family include:

- Sociology
 - Philosophy
 - Anthropology
 - Psychology
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6. Geography

Geography studies the location and distribution of places, people, materials and objects and the relationships between societies and their surroundings.

It examines:

- physical features of Earth
- human communities
- human-environment relationships
- location and distribution
- connections between places
- changes over time

Geography combines **spatial perspectives** with **temporal perspectives** and views the world as a system of interdependencies.

Tools used in Geography

Geographers use tools such as:

- Maps
 - Globes
 - Atlases
 - GIS
 - Infographics
 - Other geographical instruments
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7. History

History is the study of the human past.

It helps us understand:

- people's experiences
- values
- societies
- changes over time
- cultural traditions
- connections between past and present

Different societies have developed different ways of preserving and interpreting their past. The textbook discusses the **itihāsa-purāṇa tradition** as an important tradition of preserving cultural memory in Bharat.

Modern historiography increasingly uses **empirical evidence** and scientific methods such as:

- archaeology
 - carbon-14 dating
 - human genetics
 - analysis of historical sources
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8. Sources of History

Historians use different types of sources to study the past.

Literary Sources

These include written works such as:

- manuscripts
- travelogues
- memoirs
- correspondence
- genealogical records
- folklore and oral traditions
- revenue documents

The textbook illustrates literary sources through examples such as a **Sāmaveda manuscript** and a traditional palm-leaf manuscript of the **Tirukkuraḷ**.

Archaeological Sources

Archaeological sources include material remains such as:

- monuments
- buildings
- excavated sites
- artefacts
- sculptures
- paintings
- other objects

Their analysis may involve scientific instruments and laboratory testing.

Epigraphic Sources

An **epigraphic source** consists of texts, decrees or records inscribed on durable materials such as:

- stone
- metal plates
- rocks

Such inscriptions can provide evidence about rulers, administration, society and past events.

Numismatic Sources

Numismatic sources include:

- coins
- currency
- medals

Coins can provide information about:

- economy
- rulers
- chronology
- trade
- political boundaries
- culture

Their metal content, inscriptions and symbols can all provide historical evidence.

9. Political Science

Political Science studies governance and helps us understand:

- how power is distributed
- how decisions are made
- how policies are implemented
- constitutions
- governments
- State institutions
- social movements
- nation-building
- foreign policy
- exercise and regulation of power

Political Science and India

The textbook connects political thought in India with concepts such as:

- **dharma** — moral duty
- **artha** — economic well-being
- **rājadharmā** — duties of the ruler

It also discusses the Vedas, Upaniṣads, Purāṇas, Mahābhārata, Śhukranīti and Arthāśhāstra in relation to ideas of governance, justice, authority and responsibility.

The **Panchayati Raj system** is presented as an example of grassroots democracy and local participation.

10. Economics

Economics studies how individuals and societies decide how to use limited resources to meet their needs.

It examines:

- production
- exchange
- distribution
- consumption
- decision-making

- markets
- resources
- economic policies

Consumers decide what to buy, producers decide what and how much to produce, and governments formulate policies that attempt to balance objectives such as **growth, stability, efficiency and fairness**.

Economics is therefore connected not only with markets and numbers but also with **well-being, equity and justice**.

11. How Social Science Uses Evidence

Social Science depends on careful investigation.

Social scientists may:

- observe people's lives
- conduct interviews
- conduct surveys
- examine documents
- compare different places
- compare different periods
- gather information from multiple sources

They use this evidence to develop explanations about society and its changes.

Important idea

Observation → Evidence → Analysis → Explanation

Students should learn to distinguish between:

Evidence: information obtained from a source.

Interpretation: an explanation based on evidence.

Limits of a source: what the source cannot tell us.

12. Why Should We Study Social Science?

Social Science helps us understand the systems and relationships around us.

It helps students:

- understand society
- understand diversity
- participate responsibly in civic life
- think critically about social problems
- ask informed questions
- analyse causes and effects
- understand different perspectives
- connect past, present and future

Understanding government, laws, rights and responsibilities can help citizens participate more responsibly in public life.

13. Social Science and the Future

The importance of Social Science continues to grow as societies change.

Major changes include:

- new technologies
- expanding cities
- migration
- environmental concerns
- global connections

Social Science can help societies think about challenges such as:

- climate change
 - sustainable development
 - social harmony
 - equitable use of resources
 - responsible use of technology
